About Me

I graduated from high school in Connecticut and then attended the College of William and Mary in Virginia. I earned a B.A. in History and was commissioned as a U.S. Army Medical Service Corps officer. I served on active duty for five years in a variety of health administration positions in different military medical facilities. I then worked as a Department of the Army civilian for two years

as a Health System Specialist before I returned to full-time student status and earned two graduate degrees in public health education. I decided I wanted to focus my efforts on helping people stay healthy and delay the onset of disability rather than trying to help them after a major medical (and financial) crisis!

Focus on Pre-Health Professions

I learned about a range of health professions in military and civilian settings while a Medical Service Corps officer and Health System Specialist, but one of the great aspects of health care is that it is always changing to meet new demands. For example, when I worked in an army community hospital we struggled to hire enough Nurse Anesthetists. We did not have the option of hiring Anesthesiologist Assistants to meet that need at that time. Now there are more options because graduate degree programs in anesthesia were created to meet the needs of patients and the health care industry. I currently advise Health and Exercise Science students who are pursuing a wide range of health care professions such as physician, physician assistant, optometrist, pharmacist, occupational therapist, physical therapist and nurse. I am also the faculty advisor for Truman's Pre-Dental Club and coordinate Truman's Still Scholars committee.

Timelines

At this point in the school year, most pre-health professions students should be...

First Year

- Looking into pre-health organizations and other extracurricular activities that fit with your interests. See the newsletter from September 20th OR our Facebook page for a list of clubs & contacts.
- Attending professors' office hours and cultivating meaningful relationships with instructors and peers.

Second Year

• Reviewing what you learned last year. Keeping the information fresh will help you throughout your undergraduate and post-graduate education.

Third Year

• Selecting the schools you will apply to. Review each school's website, catalog, and requirements for admission. Visit each school in person, if possible.

Fourth Year

• Preparing for interviews. Do your research about each school to which you have applied. Practice questions and set up a mock interview with the Career Center in the SUB.

Spring 2018 Courses to Consider

Have some space in your spring schedule? Looking for a course (or two) that would be beneficial to your future in health professions?

• PHRE 350—Biomedical Ethics

Survey of issues of biomedical ethics as presented in the papers of contemporary philosophers. Development of ability to defend, orally and in writing, a position on these issues. Knowledge of major ethical theories and development of the ability to apply them to issues of biomedical ethics. Topics covered include moral principles and ethical theories; abortion; treating or terminating: the problem of impaired infants; euthanasia; paternalism; truth telling and confidentiality; medical experimentation and informed medical consent; genetics; reproductive control; allocating scarce medical resources; and the claim to medical care.

HLTH 200—Medical Terminology

Medical Terminology allows the student to develop mastery with terminology that is used in Allied Health occupations. In the process of developing mastery with medical terminology, a student has the opportunity to preview or review the fundamentals of anatomy, evaluate medical reports, and learn proper pronunciation of medical terms. The course is designed as a programmed learning and self-paced approach by body systems.

INDV 320—MCAT/Med School Success Seminar

This course is a student-led course that will support students preparing for health professions admission. Course material will cover topics applicable to all pre-health students.

If you are in your second year at Truman AND majoring in Biology, Chemistry, Exercise Science, or Health Science:
