Letters of Recommendation

When should I start talking to my letter writers?

You should start asking letter writers **in person** if they will write a letter of recommendation for you approximately 3-4 months before the “hard” deadline (when your application service opens and allows writers to upload letters).

What information should I give my letter writers?

As much as possible! After your letter writer says yes, email them a copy of your resume/CV or list of activities & extracurricular involvement, your personal statement, information about how to write a letter of recommendation for your particular healthcare field (if applicable), and any other relevant information that will help your writer write a strong recommendation.

I suggest that you give your letter writer a deadline that is determined by you — one that is a couple of weeks before the “hard” deadline.

Then what?

Approximately one week before the deadline that you gave the letter writer, send a follow-up email that kindly and respectfully reminds them about the letter they agreed to write. Something along the lines of:

“I just wanted to thank you again for writing a letter of recommendation for me, and I wondered if there was any further information you needed from me. [The application service] will be sending you a link to upload your letter around [date].

Please let me know if you have questions!”

And then thank them again before signing your name.

Where do the letter writers send their letters?

Most health professions schools now use a centralized application service (i.e., AMCAS). When you start the application and enter your letter writers’ contact information, the application service will send them an email with a link to upload their letter.

You should start your application as soon as the application is available and submit your application as soon as you have everything completed.
