Spotlight on Health Professions: Veterinarian

What is a Veterinarian?

While a veterinarian generally focuses on the health and well-being of animals, human health and well-being is also a factor in many cases. Veterinarians diagnose & treat animals as well as consider the health of animals in the environment and in groups.

How do you become a Veterinarian?

After completing the pre-requisites for veterinary school (some schools do not require a bachelor's degree), you attend veterinary school for approximately 4 years to receive your DVM or VMD. Most programs include 3 years of classroom work and 1 year of clinical work.

What is required to go to Veterinary school?

These are the Truman equivalent of the general requirements to go to Veterinary school:

- 10 hours of Biology, including:
 - BIOL 107 & 108, BIOL 200
 - -Suggested: BIOL 300 or 321, BIOL 304, BIOL 309, BIOL 302 or AGSC 320
- CHEM 130 & 131
- [CHEM 329 & 331, 330/332 or 333] or [CHEM 320] depends on major
- CHEM 335
- PHYS 185 & 186 or 195 & 196



Spring 2018 Courses to Consider

Have some space in your spring schedule? Looking for a course (or two) that would be beneficial to your future in health professions?

PHRE 350—Biomedical Ethics

Survey of issues of biomedical ethics as presented in the papers of contemporary philosophers. Development of ability to defend, orally and in writing, a position on these issues. Knowledge of major ethical theories and development of the ability to apply them to issues of biomedical ethics. Topics covered include moral principles and ethical theories; abortion; treating or terminating: the problem of impaired infants; euthanasia; paternalism; truth telling and confidentiality; medical experimentation and informed medical consent; genetics; reproductive control; allocating scarce medical resources; and the claim to medical care.

HLTH 200—Medical Terminology

Medical Terminology allows the student to develop mastery with terminology that is used in Allied Health occupations. In the process of developing mastery with medical terminology, a student has the opportunity to preview or review the fundamentals of anatomy, evaluate medical reports, and learn proper pronunciation of medical terms. The course is designed as a programmed learning and self-paced approach by body systems.
